# Consistent broad mineralisation intersected below Doublejay Open Pit as Part of Jupiter Resource extension program

#### **HIGHLIGHTS**

- The Jupiter extension drilling program has intersected mineralisation of significant width and scale below Doublejay open pit to a depth of approximately 400m below surface
- Significant intersections include 1:
  - Drillhole 22JUDD0829
    - **162.4m @ 1.0g/t from 289.7m**, including:
      - 26.0m @ 2.2g/t from 426.0m
    - 10.3m @ 2.7g/t from 197.1m
  - Drillhole 22JUDD0836
    - 92.7m @ 1.2g/t from 452.4m, including:
      - 40.2m @ 1.7g/t from 497.0m
    - 39.0m @ 0.8g/t from 313.9m
  - These results compliment previous wide intersections reported for the Jupiter syenite system, and further reinforce the width and scale of the mineralisation below the current final pit design. (See ASX announcements 25 October 2021, 21 December 2021, 18 January 2022, 7 March 2022, 4 April 2022 17 June 2022, 30 June 2022)
  - Drilling of the Jupiter extension program is continuing, and is designed to test the potential for bulk
    mineralisation across the full strike extent of the Jupiter syenite system, to a depth of ~400m below
    surface

Dacian Gold Limited (**Dacian** or **the Company**) (ASX: DCN) is pleased to report the latest intersections below the Jupiter mining complex in its next phase of drilling activities at the Jupiter extension program. The completion of the Phase 1 program and these Phase 2 drilling results confirm the potential for mineralisation of significant width and scale associated with the syenite intrusive system at the Mt Morgans Gold Operation.

CEO Dale Richards commented: "The new consistent and broad mineralisation intercepts in these latest exploration results further support the size and scale of the opportunity at the Jupiter syenite system and provide important lithological and mineralisation data in an area of the system with previous limited drilling. The current Jupiter extension drilling program is planned and scheduled to systematically delineate the extent of mineralisation within the Jupiter system to a depth of 400m below surface during H1FY23".




Figure 1: Plan view of the Jupiter syenite complex with latest drilling results

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


Figure 2: Long section view facing west of the Jupiter syenite complex with the current final pit design

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#### **Jupiter Drilling Results**

These results follow the earlier successful drilling from the Jupiter extension program at Ganymede, Heffernans and Doublejay (see ASX announcements 25 October 2021, 21 December 2021, 18 January 2022 7 March 2022, 4 April 2022, 17 June 2022, and 30 June 2022).

At Doublejay, Hole 22JUDD0829 intercepted:

- 162.4m @ 1.0g/t from 289.7m, including:
  - 26.0m @ 2.2g/t from 426.0m
  - 36.2m @ 0.9g/t from 328.9m
- 10.3m @ 2.7g/t from 197.05m, including:
  - 5.3m @ 4.6g/t from 197.1m
- Drillhole 22JUDD0836:
  - 92.7m @ 1.2g/t from 452.4m, including:
    - 40.2m @ 1.7g/t from 497.0m
    - 11.3m @ 1.8g/t from 452.8m
  - 39.0m @ 0.8g/t from 313.9m, including:
    - 12.0m @ 1.8g/t from 315.0m

These results provide additional confidence in the orientation and tenor of mineralisation within the Doublejay Joanne syenite stock, and support improved interpretation of mineralisation continuity within the system. Importantly, these results confirm mineralisation associated with the syenite basalt contact zone.

While the current program is designed to test and improve confidence in the mineralisation to a depth of 400m below surface, mineralisation remains open at depth.

Following completion of this Phase 2, and subject to continuing positive results, the Company will commence Phase 3 of the Jupiter extension program, comprising mineral resource estimation and order of magnitude studies for potential expansion of large-scale mining operations.




Figure 3: Schematic plan view of the Doublejay and Saddle sections of the Jupiter syenite complex




Figure 4: Schematic section view of Doublejay syenite in drillhole 22JUDD0829 with +-20m width




Figure 5: Schematic section view of Doublejay drillhole 22JUDD0836 with +-20m width
